After the Tika happens everyone eats and has fun. Tihar is divided in to 5 days. The first day is Kaag Tihar then Kukar Tihar. After that is Gai Tihar and

Laxmi Puja is day 3. Then it is Govardhan Puja is day 4. Lastly it is Bhai Tika on day 5. We do Bhai Tika because the god Yamraj the god of death visited his sister Yamuna. That day Yamuna applied auspicious tika on Yamraj's forehead. She feed him special dishes. That day they talked, ate, and enjoyed themselves. Then his sister gave him a gift that she made from here hands. Yamraj gave a special gift in return. He said that anyone who got tika from their sisters will not die that day. There are 7 colors of Tika. Red, orange, yellow, green, blue, purple, and white. In Bhai Tika the sisters walk around their brothers 3 times with oil then they walk around dripping water. These 5 days people hang up lights at their houses. In these days people give food to crows, cows and dogs. Sisters and brothers have a healthy and long life. This special festival happens after Dashain. This festive indicates the strong relationship between brother and sister. Tihar is the second biggest holiday for Nepalese after Dashin.
